Troop 46 Scout Skills Review

This document contains a guide for a new Scouts to prepare for the Scout Rank Review. It is to be made available on the Troop website to all Scouts so that they will know what is expected of them during their Skills Review with an Assistant Scoutmaster.

Section A lists the Scout Rank Requirements along with questions related to each requirement. Answers to all of the questions, except for those about the Scout's own experience, are available in the Scout Handbook on the pages listed for each requirement.

All requirements for the Scout rank must be completed as a member of a troop. If the Scout has already completed these requirements as part of the Arrow of Light rank in Cub Scouting, simply have them demonstrate the knowledge or skill to the Troop Guide, Patrol Advisor, or other designated leader after joining the troop. If Scouts have earned the Arrow of Light, the Scout rank should be a simple repeat of items they have already learned. But they still must complete all the requirements as Scouts BSA.

NOTE: This section contains questions that could be expected during a skills review for the Scout rank.

1a. Repeat from memory the Scout Oath, Scout Law, Scout motto, and Scout slogan. In your own words, explain their meaning. (See pages 11-18)

What does On my honor mean?

Give an example of how you lived the Scout Law today.

The Scout Handshake signifies friendship. Why is the left hand used?

1d. Describe the First Class Scout badge and tell what each part stands for. Explain the significance of the First Class Scout badge. (See pages 19-20)
